Conversations With God – Habakkuk 3:1–19 June 12-13, 2024

PSALM 34:15 The eyes of the LORD are toward the righteous and his ears toward their cry.

HABAKKUK 2:4 "Behold, his soul is puffed up; it is not upright within him, but the righteous shall live by his faith."

- 3. Continue to review in chapter 2 by reading Habakkuk 2:4. The first part of this verse refers to the Babylonians, enemies of Judah. In contrast to Babylon, how are God's people to live?
- 4. Read Habakkuk 3:1-2. Habakkuk begins his prayer with requests. What are those requests?
- 5. Read Habakkuk 3:3-7. In what ways do the descriptions of God expand how you most often think about Him?

How might your faith increase if you begin to see God more like Habakkuk does? How might increasing your faith change your everyday life?

- 6. Read Habakkuk 3:8-16. What impressions do you get about God's authority over both mankind and nature in these verses?
- 7. Read Habakkuk 3:17-19. Imagine living in a simple agrarian society like Judah in Habakkuk's day. What would these circumstances mean for the present and future in Judah?
- 8. Read Habakkuk 3:17-19 once again. Why do you think Habakkuk can trust God and find joy in the midst of very difficult circumstances?
